These examples include bullying, anything that makes the student feel unsafe, a threat, sexual harassment, and information about vandalism or thefts. The quicker information is reported to the administration, the quicker a situation can be dealt with. If you call or if your student calls, please be sure to include as much information on this confidential TIP LINE as possible. Language Arts

March Madness!! For language arts at STMS it means getting ready for write offs, testing and covering the curriculum with the school year rapidly approaching the end. Seventh grade Language Arts classes have their writing assessment on March 4. It will be given the first block of the day to all 7th grade students.

The 6th grade is focusing heavily on the writing process in preparation for the Soroptimist Writing competition. They are staying with the hero/heroine theme, following the presentation of Manny Scott of the Freedom Writers. Students are doing research and then choosing an influential woman or man from their own life about whom to write. And, of course, testing practice.

Read 180's students with Louise Ann Simon are working on non fiction reading, context and comprehension. Our writing focus is on persuasive, narrative and response to literature.

Eighth grade language arts has been studying poetry in all its different forms. Students are reading and studying poetry form and then writing their own. Our next focus will be on documents and working on the write off for the Soroptimist.

Our classes will also be cup stacking and working on a tobacco resistance education program next month. The 7th grade classes are busy working on basketball skills and combatives and looking forward to the Fitness-gram assessments that are coming up. Is your student ready? The 8th graders are completing their combatives and wrestling unit. We are also reviewing why they want to avoid drugs and alcohol. In addition to remembering what to stay away from, we are busy helping our 8th graders plan out what they can do for themselves to make their lives healthier right now.

Social Studies:

As we roll into the month of March, all grades seem busier than ever continuing to cover our grade level state standards. Eighth grade students are learning about the growth of democracy during the presidency of Andrew Jackson. Students are looking at Jackson's presidency through the eyes of four groups: the common people, States' rights supporters, the rich and well-born, and the Native Americans. Finally, eighth graders will be studying Manifest Destiny and learning how the United States expanded across the North American continent. Hujambo!
